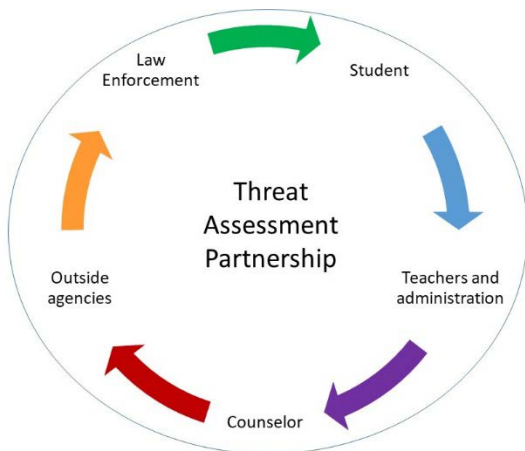
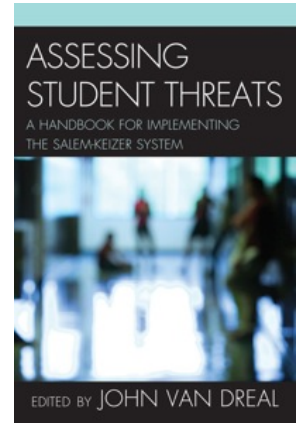

# Threat Assessment Team Training

- ⇒ With every targeted violence occurrence there were always signs recognized by others prior to the event.
- ⇒ Someone knew about the threat of violence and most of the time they reported it to someone else.
- ⇒ Various agencies receiving reports have a difficult time “connecting those dots” and using those reports in a meaningful way.
- ⇒ Every district has less formal or less comprehensive processes currently in place that need to be recognized and incorporated without duplication of efforts.
